The year 2021 was another year of challenges. Who thought that we would still be battling the pandemic a full year later, and it's not over yet! But Covid did not stop the work of TNP. We continued to take in dogs, do all the necessary vet work, and find these dogs amazing homes. Including the current dogs we have here and in foster for placement, TNP handled and is handling a total of 23 dogs in 2021.

Per the norm, we also found ourselves helping in many other situations. Vet help and food were the biggest challenges in 2021. Many folks found themselves faced with strays - dogs or cats - needing help. Rather than ignore the situation these good people stepped in to help by reaching out to TNP for additional assistance for advice, vet expenses, or food. We were happy to help with all of these where we could.

#### January

Our first adoption for 2021, **Admiral**, now called Chance, was taken from a hardship situation and fostered NY. Once all the vet work was done, Chris and Estelle decided that this big, slobbery Newf was definitely meant to be in their family. Chance continues to do well and we have seen him in many TNP Facebook posts.

**Milo** from NY was another foster situation. TNP took care of Milo's neuter and vetting. Once healed, TNP sent one of our pre-approved adopters to meet and potentially adopt Milo. It worked out great and Milo is living the life with his new family, also in NY.



#### February

**Brynn** the Newfoundland and **Cooper** the Bernese Mountain Dog from NY arrived at TNP, again, a family hardship situation, both lovely, sweet dogs who had been well cared for and well loved. Within two weeks of arrival, Cooper wasn't himself, going from eating and playing to no appetite. Vet visits, x-rays, and ultrasounds revealed a tumor that had probably been there for some time. His surgery was scheduled for the next day but Cooper didn't

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## Who's at TNP?



Seven-year-old **Samson** arrived at TNP on November 2 and tested positive for heart worm. His first treatment was on December 4, with his second injection scheduled for early January. In February Sam will have neuter surgery and then TNP will address his dislocated hip as a result of being hit by a car.

Sam is in foster care while he gets healthy enough to be adopted. He should be ready for his new home by March or April. He will be going to a wonderful home in NY.

**Clifford** is approximately 1 1/2 and was picked up as a stray in New York. He arrived at TNP with some serious orthopedic issues and will be receiving an orthopedic evaluation soon and any subsequent surgery needed. Clifford is currently at TNP and will be placed in a foster-to-adopt home.





Onyx is enjoying his new home with Rebecca Diamond in Lansdowne, PA, just outside of Philadelphia, after being adopted last month. He loves to

play tug-of-war with Rebecca, and with his ball and soft toys.

This 3-year-old boy didn't know how to walk well on a leash, but Rebecca reports, "We have been working on manners and he is doing better." Onyx is not food motivated, which Rebecca had not experienced before with dogs, so she has been working with a trainer since mid-December to reduce pulling. "He prefers play and being outside," Rebecca said.

Onyx is Rebecca's first Newfoundland, although she has had dogs for 20 years, including three Leonbergers. She had been looking for a dog for about a year and a half – but was not breed specific - and joined a variety of Facebook groups, including TNP, where she saw Onyx. Currently, he is the only pet.

Onyx's favorite pastime is the dog park, where he goes at least three times a week. He loves playing with the other dogs.
"He completely ignores me,"



Rebecca said. "He won't even take treats."

"He's like a wind-up toy to her." Mabel watches him run about and dash under the kitchen table.

Linda works in a flower shop a couple of days a week and Mabel goes with her. Of course, Mabel has charmed everyone. "She's been a great ambassador," Linda said.

Mabel also enjoys her stuffed toys, including a lamb, and a flattened squirrel and raccoon that she likes to play with after dinner and before bed.

Linda grew up with Newfies, which her mom got from breeders in the 1940s through 1960s. As an adult, Linda has had eight Newfoundlands, all from rescues and four from Cathy/TNP. Max was the first, in the 1980s. Then came Milo in 2006 or 2007, Robbie in 2014, and now Mabel. Linda is impressed with the way the TNP rescue is run – with the needs of the dogs coming first. # **Expert Excerpts**

#### January is National Eye Care Month

Although dogs' eyesight is not their strongest sense, it is important to keep their eyes healthy. Several eye diseases are common among dogs and they can experience discomfort, vision impairment and vision loss. In fact, dog and human eyes are very similar in design and function and experience similar ailments. The most common include:

**Cataracts** are a medical condition that causes the eye lens to become progressively opaque and are identifiable as thick, white spots at the center of the eye. Cataracts can cause impaired vision and may require surgery. Causes are heredity, eye trauma, or other health conditions such as diabetes.

**Glaucoma** is an unhealthy increase of pressure in the eye that can damage the retina and potentially lead to blindness. Symptoms include watery discharge, redness, protruding or enlarged eyes, and lethargy. Glaucoma is usually treated with medication; however, advanced glaucoma may lead to removal of the eye. Causes are hereditary, tumors behind the eye or scar tissue build up.

**Dry eye** is caused by not producing enough tears. Symptoms include redness, excessive blinking, and mucus discharge. Dry eye is treated with lifelong eye lubrication drops. Causes are aging, certain medical conditions, and thyroid disorders.

**Conjunctivitis**, also known as pink eye, is inflammation or infection of the conjunctiva, the tissue that lines the eyelids, caused by a virus. Symptoms include pink or red color in the whites of the eye, swelling of the conjunctiva, increased tear production, and itching or irritation. Medication is usually prescribed.

**Entropion** is a condition where a dog's eyelid rolls inward, causing eyelashes to rub on the cornea. It is a painful condition which unfortunately, too often goes untreated and can cause damage to the eye. Symptoms include squinting, increased eye discharge, increased tear production, rubbing with his paw, and discomfort. Entropion can be a congenital problem or develop as a result of chronic squinting due to discomfort or eyelid scarring.

If entropion has occurred because of a condition that will resolve, a veterinarian can temporarily suture the eyelids into a more normal position. Surgery to permanently fix abnormal eyelid anatomy is necessary in other cases and although many veterinarians don't perform the procedure, they can refer you to a specialist.

A call from a NY vet and animal control officer (ACO) told us about **Clifford**, a brown Newf stray picked up and never claimed. The ACO kindly met us part way and we picked up Clifford who the vet estimated at nine months to two years of age. We had him vetted and neutered. Orthopedically, Clifford has issues. X-rays have been taken and sent to an orthopedic specialist. His ortho problems appear to be genetic but at this time we are not sure if and what can be done. Clifford (the name given to him by the vet and ACO) is a very happy boy and not in pain and is quite mobile. Stay tuned for updates.

**Lilly** is a ten-month-old Landseer brought to TNP by family hardship. She has been vetted and spay is next. Lilly is adorable and will be a great addition for the right family. Stay tuned.

Three-year-old **Mabel** the brown Newf and 2 ½ year old **Stella** the English Black Labrador from NY just arrived at TNP due to family hardship. Both Mabel and Stella need to be vetted and spayed. 

**Corneal scratches or ulcers** occur when the clear outer layer of the eye is damaged. Tearing and discharge may occur. Left untreated, ulcers can lead to infection, loss of vision, or eye removal. Most ulcers are treated with medication.

**Cherry eye** occurs when the third eyelid of dogs, which is normally not visible, pops out of its location due to weak





#### Signs of Eye Trouble

Healthy canine eyes are moist and clear. Pupils should be equal in size and react to light. Dogs typically exhibit physical or behavioral symptoms when they experience eye trouble. These include, redness, tearing, squinting or closed eyelids, rubbing the eye, face, or head, blinking, discharge, or cloudiness. Most dogs develop a haze in the lens as they age, which rarely causes vision impairment. Is it different from cataracts as it has a slight blue tint.

Discharge is also common among many dogs as a result of allergies or the shape of their head and as a stand-alone symptom is likely not a problem. If additional symptoms persist, see your veterinarian.

#### **Eye Care Tips**

Keep all hair out of your dog's eyes to avoid scratches to the cornea. Keep eyes clear of mucus by wiping with ophthalmic wipes or eyewash. Be sure to avoid soap near the eyes during bath time. Most importantly, make sure your dog has annual eye exams with your veterinarian to keep those peepers healthy.
