Keep in mind that TNP places dogs in homes that are in the best interest of the dog, but welcomes applicants to express interest in dogs through TNP Facebook posts.


July TNP Open House

Shampooing a Newf and Other Double Coated Dog Breeds

It may seem straightforward to wash a dog - add water, shampoo, and rinse - but for dogs with double coats, the process is a bit more complicated to ensure both a clean and tangle free dog.

Nancy Molnar is the Correspondence Secretary at TNP and was a professional groomer for Newfoundlands, and pets of all breeds, for 15 years. She is experienced in show pets and also owned a mobile grooming business for many years. She shares her expertise in keeping your Newf clean and looking great in between professional grooming,

"The main thing I stress to everyone is NEVER SHAMPOO A MATTED OR UNBRUSHED NEWF!" Nancy said. "You will have more mats, and these can develop into worse mats sometimes causing hot spots. Your dog could potentially develop an infection with a trip to the vet's office, antibiotics, and of course the E-Collar to stop them from licking and/or scratching the hot spot."

Nancy recommends you brush out the undercoat well before shampooing. This will prevent mats and tangling after bathing. Really soak your Newf with cool water before shampooing and always rinse until you can not see anymore bubbles or feel any soapy spots. The hair should "SQUEAK."

Nancy says that whatever shampoo you use ALWAYS dilute it with 4 parts water and 1 part shampoo unless more of a ratio is stated on the shampoo or conditioner bottle. You will not be able to get the shampoo or conditioner completely out of the coat if it's not diluted. If you use a conditioner this should also be diluted with 4 parts water and 1 part shampoo unless otherwise stated on the shampoo bottle. If you don't, you'll end up with a GREASY DOG!

Deciding on the best shampoo can be confusing, "When buying a shampoo and reading labels it is as confusing as reading labels on food," Nancy said. "I look for the following ingredients to NOT BE in the shampoo or conditioner:

- Formaldehyde this can be absorbed by the skin and has been linked to cancer
- Mineral oil
- Parabens
- Artificial colors, Synthetic fragrances and or perfumes
- Methylchloroisothiazolin this is an organic compound which is toxic
- Phthalates this is a group of chemicals which could be fragrances, oily liquids, etc.
- Ammonium lauryl sulfate this is like a detergent

So, how do choose a good shampoo and/or conditioner? Nancy recommends products that are hypoallergenic, free from harsh chemicals, laboratory tested, endorsed by the Veterinary Associations or recommended by your vet, breeder or rescue person(s). It is also not recommended to use a "deshedding" shampoo or conditioner. Newfs and double coated breeds are supposed to shed!

"I have used Burt's Bees brand, Miracle Coat (which also has a great spray for in-between

bathing, itchy/flaky skin and that doggie smell), Mr. Groom shampoo &

conditioners (also their finishing conditioner spray, which even has a sunscreen in it along with extra shine from mink oil & Vitamin E oil. They are not heavy on the coat and smell phenomenal.)

When I had my seven Newfs I also use Mane 'n Tail. They have a number of various shampoos and conditioners. They originally started as a horse shampoo. I know HUMANS that have used this due to their long hair, wanting it to be strengthened and nourished, minimizing breakage."



If your Newf has flaky, itchy skin, try an oatmeal based product. This will soothe and moisturize the dog's skin and coat. If your dog has *really* dry, flaky, and itchyskin then it is recommended to use HexaDerm. HexaDerm features a deep cleansing and deodorizing action with a soap-free formula. It contains chlorhexidine which helps treat skin conditions and protects against bacteria, yeast, and fungi that cause skin infections. HexaDerm also includes ceramides to support and restore the natural lipid barrier of the skin. Note that you may need a prescription for HexaDerm and be sure to wash your hand thoroughly after use.



Nancy's takeaway is "to use a soap-free shampoo option that soothes and hydrates rather than drying out skin and coat. Use "made in USA" products for the best quality. Above all, NEVER USE HUMAN products. The PH levels can cause skin irritation."



According to Journal of the American Medical Association, an air temperature of 85 degrees can cause the asphalt temperature to reach 135 degrees. To find out if the asphalt is too hot, place your hand on the pavement. If it's too hot after 7 seconds, it's too hot for your Newf

to walk on and can cause discomfort, blisters, or burns to paw pads. Avoid hot surfaces and walk your dog during cooler times of the day. You may want to invest in protective wear for those sensitive feet or smear on a generous amount of paw wax. Be mindful of your Newf's behavior on the walk. If he shows discomfort, slows down, or tries to hop away from the surface, check his paws and seek medical attention if necessary.
